

AWARDS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS



Virginia Law Enforcement Challenge Award

In 2015, the Herndon Police Department was recognized for its outstanding efforts in traffic safety and was **awarded first place** in the annual Virginia Law Enforcement Challenge. The annual competition is sponsored by the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police and is designed to encourage and promote traffic safety and enforcement programs throughout Virginia with an emphasis on impaired driving, speeding, aggressive driving, and seat belt and passenger safety enforcement. In its award-winning

submission, the department highlighted its participation in traffic safety campaigns to target speeding, impaired driving and improve seat belt usage.

Mothers Against Drunk Driving Award

Herndon Police Officers Calo and Finley were recognized Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) on May 1, 2015 for their outstanding enforcement efforts against drunk driving underage drinking. The 24nd Annual Awards for Excellence in Community Service and Public Safety ceremony was hosted by MADD and the Fairfax Alcohol Safety Action Program.





WRAP Award

The Herndon Police Department was recognized for its efforts in combating drunk driving in our community. Officer Eliezer Calo received an award at the 18th Annual Washington Regional Alcohol Program (WRAP) award ceremony along with 12 other officers from around the region for outstanding efforts over the past year.

World Police and Fire Games

The Herndon Police Department Motor Team placed third in the team slow ride for the Mid-Atlantic rodeo competition and received a bronze medal in the World Police and Fire games.



Task Force Partnerships

Task force partnerships allow the department to effectively pursue special investigations which are time consuming and require additional expertise or resources. The department continues its partnership with the multi-jurisdictional Northern Virginia Gang Task Force to investigate gang crime, Fairfax County Police Vice/Narcotics Unit, to facilitate narcotics investigations, and also with the Virginia State Police on the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force to conduct investigations and identify and apprehend offenders of child victims of internet-based crimes.

Safe Trade Zone

The Department established a "Safe Trade Zone" in the parking lot of the police station for **use by the public as a meeting place to complete online transactions.** The area is well lit and monitored by security cameras. A sign has been placed outside to identify this designated area.



COMMUNITY POLICING

The Department recognizes the importance of crime prevention, community involvement and outreach and proactive community policing teams as critical components of its community policing program. The community policing program promotes police/citizen partnerships and supports interactive problem-solving strategies to address crime and citizens' concerns. Community policing augments traditional law enforcement services by building effective partnerships with citizens to work together towards the common goal of making Herndon a safe place to live and work.

Crime Prevention

The Herndon Police Department offers a range of programs and activities to educate and inform citizens about crime prevention. The Crime Prevention Officer works closely with all department members to ascertain local crime concerns in order to offer education and prevention strategies to citizens, community groups, businesses and neighborhoods. The Crime Prevention Officer is involved with citizens and community groups through Neighborhood, Business and Fleet Watches, National Night Out, and other community-sponsored events and activities which promote public safety. Certified Crime Prevention Community

The Herndon Police Department is dedicated to its community and crime prevention efforts and meets the standards to be designated as a Certified Crime Prevention Community (CCPC) by the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services. The CCPC certification consists of a defined set of rigorous standards related to community safety that must be met which fosters the development of community safety initiatives at the local level. The department went through recertification in April 2016.

Neighborhood/Business/Fleet Watch Programs

Citizens who want to work with law enforcement to keep an "eye and ear" on their communities make up the Neighborhood, Business and Fleet Watch programs. Watch programs are an important part of crime prevention and the department provides watch coordinators with a monthly report of crime activities, crime prevention tips and special crime alerts. In 2015, there were 20 active neighborhood watches, nine active business watches and two active fleet watch programs in the town. Watch programs are active partners with police.



National Night Out

The Herndon Police Department participates in the National Night Out program each year to highlight its commitment to crime prevention and community partnerships in the Town of Herndon. In 2015, 13 neighborhoods participated in National Night Out activities by hosting barbeques, providing activities for kids, and organizing other community events. National Night Out is held the first Tuesday in August every year.



Citizens' Police Academy

The Herndon Police Department held its inaugural Citizens' Police Academy in 1994, and continues the program each year by offering a Citizens, Youth, or Senior Police Academy. Each academy is specifically designed to provide the participants with a better understanding of the department's operations through an informative class and handson activities. The Department held a Youth Police Academy in 2015. Drug Take Back Program

The Herndon Police Department hosted a National Drug Take Back Initiative in 2015. The event provides an opportunity for the department to educate the public about the potential abuse of medications and offers a safe and responsible venue for persons who want to dispose of unwanted or unused prescription drugs. The event resulted in the collection of 186 pounds of prescription drugs.



CONTRA COP

Coffee with a Cop

"Coffee with a Cop" provides a unique opportunity for community members to meet a police officer and ask specific questions to learn more about the ways the department addresses issues and endeavors to make an impact in the community. The Chief of Police hosted a "Coffee with a Cop" breakfast at Amphora's Restaurant as an outreach to allow for one-on-one interaction in a relaxed environment. Attorney General Mark Herring attended the event.

Chief's Advisory Council

The Chief of Police established an advisory council comprised of citizens to assist the Herndon Police by providing input on community policing programs, promoting crime prevention efforts and supporting the department in other community liaison activities and initiatives. The council meets quarterly.

Community Policing Teams

In January 2016, the community policing districts underwent a review and reclassification. To better balance the district boundaries and more effectively deploy personnel and resources, the department reduced its community policing districts from five districts (Bruin, Center, Golf Course, Haley Smith and Runnymede) to four. The new district names are now Dranesville, Dulles, Metro, and Worldgate. A team leader and officers are assigned to each district as part of a Community Action Team to proactively patrol the district, monitor crime and activity of the district, address concerns or specific issues of residents and businesses within the district, and act as a point of reference to facilitate other services of the town that could be accessed to resolve a particular issue.




Statistical Summary

The chart below compares offense data on major categories of crime in the Town of Herndon between 2014 and 2015. Overall, crime reported in the town as compared to 2014 is down by 11 percent. Statistical increases were seen in reports of weapon offenses, counterfeiting/forgery, and sex offenses, but based on actual incidents, the increases were relatively minor. Based on the prevalence of offenses in categories such as drunkenness, larcenies, and assaults; a slight increase was seen in simple assaults. Drunkenness and larceny offenses resulted in minor decreases but continue as key categories of activity each year.

2015 Activity at a Glance

Crime activity in Herndon during 2015 is depicted graphically below to demonstrate the major categories of crime as a percentage of total crime in the town. Larcenies, assault offenses (non-aggravated), and drunkenness were the most prevalent categories of offenses in 2015. Larceny offenses include shoplifting, thefts from buildings, persons, or vehicles, reports of credit and debit card fraud and other miscellaneous larcenies. Assault offenses included non-aggravated attacks with limited injuries; 41 percent of these cases were domestic, meaning the offender and the victim were related. Drunkenness offenses largely include public drunkenness arrests.



Criminal Investigations

The Criminal Investigations Section investigates criminal cases that include murder, sexual assault, aggravated assault, robbery, fraud/identity theft, auto theft, embezzlement, child abuse and missing person cases. The top categories of investigations in 2015 were:

- 1. Sex Offense
- 2. Larceny
- 3. Fraud
- 4. Felony Assaults
- 5. Runaways
- 6. Burglary

The Criminal Investigations Section is led by a sergeant. Cases are assigned to three criminal detectives and three special assignment detectives. The special assignment detectives work in specialized investigations in conjunction with task forces: Northern Virginia Gang Task Force, Fairfax County Police Vice/Narcotics Unit, and the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force.


In 2015, the Criminal Investigations Section added 296 new cases for investigation in addition to their ongoing caseload.

As cyber-crime continues to grow and investigations become more complex due to technology, the department is fortunate to have a Computer Forensics detective. The Computer Forensics detective participates with the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force but also conducts computer forensic investigations for routine crimes such as robberies, fraud, runaways, along with conducting presentations to the public about cyber-safety. These investigations are highly specialized, time-consuming, and require a great deal of training and expertise. In 2015, the Computer Forensics detective was assigned or assisted with 132 cases involving the recovery of digital forensic evidence on various electronic devices and platforms.




Arrests


The following graphs provide a breakdown of total arrests, juvenile versus adult arrests, misdemeanor versus felony arrests, and total warrants served, over the past five years. Total arrests were down by 13 percent from 2014. This decrease was reflected in a reduction in both misdemeanor and felony arrests.




*Total number of people arrested.



Arrests, Warrants Served




*In cases where a person is arrested on both felony and misdemeanor warrants, only the most serious (felony) is reported in this chart.





Calls for Service and Police Activity


The charts below illustrate all calls for service and police activity, including response to calls and self-initiated activity. Total calls for service indicate the same general trend as previous years. Calls are highest during the evening rush hour and late night hours. A noticeable decline in calls can be seen this year during the evening rush hour period. High call volume (traffic complaints, accidents, vehicle stops) associated with the intersection of Herndon Parkway/Sterling Road resulted in a reduction of 56 percent at this location between the hours of 3pm – 7pm between 2014 and 2015 due to upgrades completed to the intersection in late 2014.



A slight reduction in calls for service was seen on Saturday, and the largest reduction resulted on Thursday. Friday continues to be the day with the highest number of calls for service.




Traffic Activity



Citations declined 34 percent from 2014 largely attributable to personnel shortages and training mandates.


Accidents




Traffic accidents in 2015 increased 3 percent over 2014 and were up moderately from the four-year accident average (2011-2014) of 639. Accidents with injuries nearly doubled from 2014 to 2015. *Failure to yield the right of way* was the predominant violation in accidents, and accounted for 15 percent of total accidents.

Accident Analysis

The greatest number of crashes in 2015 occurred in the months of May (84) and June (71).




The highest number of crashes (142) occurred between 4:00PM and 6:00PM with the second highest (113) between 6:00PM and 8:00PM. These two time frames represent 36 percent of the total crashes for 2015. These consistent timeframe statistics appear to correlate to increased traffic in the Town during the late



afternoon and evening rush hours.

DUI Arrests and Alcohol Related Accidents



The detection and arrest of the impaired driver continues to be a top priority for the department. There were 124 DUI arrests made by the department for driving while intoxicated during 2015; a 5 percent increase from the 118 arrests in 2014. By contrast, there were 19 alcohol-related crashes in 2015 as compared to 31 in 2014. Alcohol-related accidents decreased by 38 percent. While it is gratifying to note the positive results in decreased alcohol-related accidents, statistics confirm that alcohol/drug impaired driving remains a valid concern in our jurisdiction and enforcement efforts to deter drinking and driving continues to have a considerable focus.

The department takes proactive measures to address impaired driving and continues to seek ways to reduce associated accidents. These measures include:

Traffic Analysis

The department prepares an annual traffic analysis to review traffic enforcement activities, traffic concerns and complaints, and other issues to determine the effectiveness of its safety programs and initiatives and identify ways to strategically use resources to increase traffic safety in Herndon.


Selective Enforcement

Certain factors, prevalent locations of frequent enforcement activity, and reports or complaints of traffic problems are considered each month in order to formulate a plan to direct enforcement efforts towards identified problems or specific violations. These monthly enforcement efforts provide proactive resources to address violations and promote traffic safety throughout Herndon.

Campaigns and Initiatives

Proactive DUI saturation patrols, DUI checkpoints, national safety campaigns and local initiatives contribute to the department's efforts to curb drunk driving. The department supplements these activities with individual initiatives to educate community members and local restaurants and bars about the dangers of drunk driving and collaborates with the Virginia Alcohol and Beverage Control Board to target businesses that may be selling to underage consumers.







INDIVIDUAL COMMUNITY POLICING DISTRICT DATA



The following district data is represented under the five district format; the new districts will be reflected in the next annual report.





Bruin District
(Reclassified to Worldgate District)






Center District
(Reclassified to Dulles District)






Golf Course District








Haley Smith District




